CCRC specific criteria:

- 1) Operational relevance to the CCRC?
 - a) Will the research further our understanding of our processes?
 - b) Will the research further our understanding of/provide academic insight into CCRC- specific casework issues?
- 2) Operational relevance to the wider Criminal Justice System?
 - a) If yes, will this also further our understanding of our own processes?
 - b) Will this also further our understanding of/provide academic insight into CCRC-specific casework issues?
- 3) Stakeholder interest? Will it benefit any particular stakeholders?
- 4) Reputation of the CCRC any particular benefits or risks involved?
- 5) Sensitivity issues any particular risks involved?
- 6) Staff resources- impact on CCRC staff resources?
- 7) Anything else which the CCRC considers significant at the time of application.

Academic criteria:

- 8) Credibility/track record of empirical research of researcher?
- 9) Quality of proposed methodology?
- 10) Appropriateness of proposed methodology in relation to subject matter and outlined objectives?
- 11)Probability of securing funding taking into account: track record of researcher, plans for impact, scale of funding sought, appropriateness of funding plans in relation to the proposed project?
